Known as the best-preserved Gold Rush town in California, Columbia is a place where visitors are truly immersed in authentic California history. Gold was discovered in Columbia on March 27, 1850. By 1870, the "Gem of the Southern Mines" produced more than \$1 billion (in today's figures). Today the town still bustles with shops, exhibits, and the lively activity of the 1850's.

You'll know you've arrived when you hear the clang of a hammer at the blacksmith shop, smell the candles and soap at the candle store, visit authentic brick buildings, and taste treats from the candy store, bakery, or tea house.

Embrace your pioneer spirit! Pan for gold, sip a sarsaparilla, pick up provisions or supplies. Take an adventurous ride on the stagecoach. Enjoy live theatre at the Fallon House. See the house that Grace Kelly called home in the film "High Noon."

Docents staff the park museum, dressed circa 1850-1870. Columbia hosts many events throughout the year that celebrate the Gold Rush era including a Victorian Easter Egg Hunt, Glorious 4th of July, lamplight tours at Christmastime and many more! Admission to the park is free, and there are plenty of dining options both inside and outside the park. Nearby RV parks and the Columbia Airport are within walking distance to Columbia State Historic Park.



Railtown 1897 State Historic Park

The "Southern Mines" of Tuolumne County hit their second heyday in 1897 with the completion of the Sierra Railway tracks to Jamestown, Sonora, and eventually, in 1900, to Tuolumne City. This meant boom times for the lumber, hard rock and cattle industries. Later, the railroad was key to building dams that created Lake Tulloch, Don Pedro, and Hetch Hetchy Reservoirs.

Railtown 1897 brings this era to life. The 26-acre park is open daily for tours featuring the active roundhouse complex, belt driven machine shop, historic locomotives, passenger cars, and movie props like smokestacks, headlights, and station signs. Railtown 1897 is known as "The Movie Railroad" and its trains, including the famous Sierra No. 3®, have been featured in over 300 films, television shows and commercials since its first movie in 1919.

Excursion train rides are available on weekends April – October, holidays, and for special events. The Depot Store is well-appointed with toys, souvenirs, books, and more about railroads and the California Gold Rush. The park is operated by California State Parks and supported by the California State Railroad Museum Foundation.

Railtown 1897 is listed on the National Register of Historic Places as the Sierra Railway Shops Historic District. CALAVERAS BIG TREES STATE PARK 209-795-1196

Gold Country Itinerary



Discover Tuolumne County's Gold Country

Highway 49, which in its entirety spans 300 miles of California's Gold Country from Madera County in the south to Sierra County in the north, is known as one of "America's best drives." Embark on a tour of Tuolumne County's section of the legendary route to immerse yourself in a time when people were looking to strike it rich and begin a new way of life.

JAMESTOWN

Jamestown was where gold was first discovered in Tuolumne County in 1848, making it the perfect place to start your road trip.

Places to visit:

During a stroll along Jamestown's Main Street, visit several of the town's buildings dating back to the 1870s and 1880s that are occupied by quaint historic inns, restaurants and shops, microbrewery, and wine tasting room for your enjoyment. Rocca Park features an introductory exhibit to the "Walk of Fame," which highlights Tuolumne County's show business history. Also, find

the Jamestown Museum in the form of a replica blacksmith shop and a historic jail.

RAILTOWN 1897 STATE HISTORIC PARK

There's nothing quite like the sights, sounds, and smells of the railroad. At Railtown 1897 State Historic Park, take a guided or self-guided tour of the grounds and historic railroad shops or take a train ride on the weekends April through October. See more about Railtown on page 7.

OUTSKIRTS OF TOWN

Hike the fantastic trails at Red Hills Recreation Management Area to enjoy seasonal wildflower displays and wildlife viewing.

Partake in some local wine tasting with scenic vistas of the foothills or try your luck at Chicken Ranch Casino with 24-hour gaming action. The Chicken Ranch Casino expansion includes a luxury hotel and conference center.

Visit Chinese Camp, a California Historical Landmark, which was once home to 5,000 Chinese miners in addition to as many Americans and Europeans. Today, the town is mostly abandoned, and the buildings are being reclaimed by nature.

SONORA

The largest and only incorporated city in Tuolumne County, Sonora is a great base camp for a visit and is an easy access point to all the fun in the surrounding area.

Places to visit:

Sonora's historic downtown is home to shops, galleries, restaurants, and fascinating museums. Step inside the impressive Tuolumne County History Museum, housed in the former jail, established in 1857. Another notable stop is The Red Church, which is one of the most photographed icons in the County. Downtown is home to 2nd Saturday Art Nights, which feature art of all kinds and live music on the second Saturday night of each month year-round.

OUTSKIRTS OF TOWN

Located near downtown, a hike on the Dragoon Gulch Trail offers a great way to stretch the legs. Over three miles of trails of varying difficulty lead the way through the oak and Manzanita landscape with great views of downtown Sonora along the way.

Tee off on the 18-hole Teleli Golf Course spanning over the rolling foothills outside of town. Players who are out later in the day are treated to one of the most scenic sunset viewing spots around.

A short distance east of town, discover Indigeny Reserve whose organic hard apple cider will ruin you for any other hard cider. Distilled carefully with pride and love on the family-owned and operated property, the cider pairs perfectly with a relaxing picnic on the spacious, beautiful grounds or on a nice hike around the orchard.

TOWN OF TUOLUMNE

The small town of Tuolumne is located just a short way off Highway 49, southeast of Sonora. It is steeped in interesting history.

Places to visit:

A visit to the Tuolumne City Memorial Museum is worth the trip to learn about the town and its inhabitants through time.

Stop by the nearby 9/11 Global War on Terrorism Memorial to pay respects and reflect. Across the street is West Side Memorial Park, which is nice for relaxing and picnicking. On Wednesday evenings in the summer, enjoy Concerts in the Park and Outdoor Market.

NEARBY

The West Side Trail, is an easy hiking trail

that was once part of the network of rail lines owned by the West Side Lumber Company. The trail features scenic views along with interpretive exhibits and spectacular spring wildflower displays.

Treat yourself at Cover's Apple Ranch. Not only is it a local favorite bakery and restaurant, but the kids (and grown-ups) will enjoy a miniature train ride and petting zoo. You must try the Mile-High Apple Pie!

Black Oak Casino Resort offers exciting nightlife, restaurants, a family floor with high-tech bowling alley and arcade, plus hotel and RV park. New to the resort, *Elevate* is a 20,000 square-foot indoor family fun park.

COLUMBIA

The small town of Columbia is home to Columbia State Historic Park a living, breathing Gold Rush-era town, RV parks, historic churches, general aviation airport, community college, and more.

Places to visit: COLUMBIA STATE HISTORIC PARK

An immersive experience awaits, complete with old-fashioned shops, stagecoach rides, gold panning, schoolhouse, live theatre, and saloons pouring sarsaparilla, and much more. The park is free to visit and dog-friendly! See more about Columbia on page 6.

NEARBY

Enjoy live music and local wine and beer tasting at local tasting rooms or play a round of disc golf at the newly developed and wooded Pioneer Park Disc Golf Course.


Get a look at the replica of Mark Twain's Cabin where the infamous author resided during the winter of 1864-1865. The replica is built around the fireplace and chimney of the original cabin, located about one mile off Highway 49 near the northern boundary of Tuolumne County.

Pioneer Spotlights



RACHEL SABATINE, OWNER

VTC: How long have you been making beer in Tuolumne County?

ATH: We opened our doors in July 2020.

VTC: Why did you choose this region to start your brewing company?

ATH: Who wouldn't want to live within 25 miles of Yosemite National Park, one of the most beautiful locations in the world?!

We are fortunate to brew using water from Hetch Hetchy, the reservoir within Yosemite National Park. It's some of the cleanest, crispest water on the planet and is an amazingly pure base for our beer.

TC: What is your favorite part about making beer?

ATH: We love playing with different ingredients to add depth to our beer. For IPAs, that means using unique hop varietals, innovative hopping techniques, and new forms of hops. For sours and stouts we like to push the envelope on fruit combinations and complementary flavors, such as with our award-winning Tip Top Lollipop: Mixed Berry Pie, which used blackberry, black currant, cranberry, cherry, apricot, cinnamon, vanilla, and lactose.

VTC: How long does it take to make a batch of beer?

ATH: It depends on the type of yeast we're using. Lagers and Pilsners take a minimum of seven weeks. Ales take approximately three weeks. Ale yeast is used for most of our products: IPAs, sours, blondes, stouts, etc.

VTC: What is one thing that you would want everyone to know about Around the Horn?

ATH: We believe that there is a beer for everyone (who is 21 or older, of course!). Even if you're not usually a beer drinker, there is probably something on our draft board that you are going to enjoy, because we're all about variety. Plus, we make our own hard seltzer and beer slushies in the warmer months. For those who don't drink, we have plenty of non-alcoholic options. And we also serve food, such as our famous pretzels with homemade beer cheese and our Around the Horn-style Cuban sandwich.

Inner Sanctum Cellars Basecamp

KAREN LUCKHARDT, OWNER

VTC: How long have you been making wine in Tuolumne County?

ISC: Since 2011

VTC: Why did you choose this region to start your winery and tasting room?

ISC: We have lived here for 43 years and once in the business we knew the soil of Tuolumne County would grow great grapes, especially Spanish varietals.

Pete & Karen

VTC: What is your favorite part about making wine?

ISC: Harvest, actually picking the grapes and helping process them with our winemaker.

VTC: How long does it take to make a batch of wine?

ISC: It takes six to eight months for our white wines and two years for our reds.

VTC: What is one thing that you would want everyone to know about Inner Sanctum Cellars?

ISC: All of our wines are made with grapes grown here and along the Highway 49 (Gold Country) corridor. We specially choose small vineyards (three to five acres) because the growers have more time to watch the growth of the grapes. Inner Sanctum Cellars Basecamp not only has wine, but a taproom with eight taps with as many local beers as possible. We also carry local cider.

Indigeny Reserve JAY WATSON, CO-OWNER

VTC: How long have you been producing cider in Tuolumne County?

IR: Ten plus years, and many more to go!

VTC: Why did you choose this region to start your business?

IR: We started with the intention of preserving of old apple orchards.

> **VTC:** What is your favorite part about making cider?

IR: Getting into the science of how to create a blend and working in the alcohol beverage industry.

VTC: How long does it take to make a batch of cider?

IR: It can take six to nine weeks.

VTC: What is one thing that you would want everyone to know about Indigeny Reserve?

IR: We are on 120 acres of apple orchards, from harvest to bottle the operation is on-site. We are family oriented and offer so many different ways to enjoy our place from cider tasting, picnicking, biking, hiking, disc golf, and more.







The history of packers in Tuolumne County dates back to the 1800s, when packers had an essential role in the California Gold Rush. Packers were used to bring supplies to gold mining camps throughout the Sierra Nevada mountains and Gold Country. Following the Gold Rush, the High Sierra saw an exploration and recreational boom that continues today. Tuolumne County embraces its packing history with two pack stations, Aspen Meadow and Kennedy Meadows. Both are open seasonally, May-October, and provide horseback trail rides and pack trips.

Aspen Meadow Pack Station

SETH DIEMEL, CO-OWNER

VTC: How long have you been packing in the High Sierra?

AM: Aspen Meadows Pack Station Inc. was established in 1929 and has been packing into the Emigrant Wilderness ever since. It has changed ownership multiple times over the years but has always provided day rides along with overnight pack trips into the Emigrant Wilderness.

VTC: What is your favorite part of packing?

AM: This type of work is extremely rewarding because we get to provide access to a wide range of people who all want to use this wilderness. You are fortunate enough to take kids on their very first horseback ride or take families on backcountry trips. The memories created by these adventures are incredible and often become yearly traditions for families.

VTC: How long does it take to prepare for a pack trip?

AM: Pack trips are completely custom for each group. So, trips vary depending on if the party is just using us for transportation to their destination, or if we will be providing the entire camp along with a cook and gear. Typically, customers book their trips at least a month in advance, but we operate seven days a week all summer so there are always options.

VTC: What is one thing that you would want everyone to know about packing?

AM: Packing into the Sierra allows families to experience their public lands in an extremely unique way. Riding horses is an experience people never forget, and camping at High Sierra lakes is unmatched.

High Sierra Itinerary



Explore Tuolumne County's High Sierra

Highway 108 is the path for the explorer and adventure seeker alike. Known for lovely waterfalls in spring, colorful wildflowers in summer, vivid foliage in fall, and snow adventures in winter, the trip is full of beauty year-round.* The Highway 108 corridor is one that is nostalgic for families that have ascended to their favorite spots for generations.

Traveling east on Highway 108, you'll go through the towns of Jamestown and Sonora, where you can stop to explore, grab some food and water, and top off the gas tank. As you venture up in elevation, see the landscape change from rolling oakcovered hills to steeper, forested mountains and granite peaks.

Places to Visit:

The town named for authors Mark Twain and Bret Harte is small but has much to offer in the way of unique shops, restaurants, distinctive lodging options, activities, and charm. Twain Harte is an ideal option as a basecamp for your road trip with easy access to all sorts of recreational activities on the Stanislaus National Forest, which frames much of Highway 108.

Putting a round at Twain Harte Miniature Golf is a must-do. It's a simple and cute vintage course that's over 65 years old, but

don't be fooled-you're in for a challenging and very fun game! Take a selfie at the iconic giant root beer mug in the center of town, browse the town's quaint shops, and stay locally in a vacation rental or bed and breakfast inn.

During the summer months, the lively Thursday night "Mountain Air Market" features local artisans, food vendors, and live music. On Saturday nights, the "Concerts in the Pines" live music series in Eproson Park will get you dancing or at least singing along. Both events are free!

PINECREST LAKE

Take your time to soak in the scenery and the smell of the pine trees as you wind your way up the mountain through small villages to Pinecrest Lake, a family-favorite destination for generations. It's easy to see why it's special...there's not much that you can't do there. Hike around the lake, fish, rent a boat (there are several types to choose from), picnic, swim, sunbathe, bird watch (bald eagles are often spotted), and camp. A real treat is taking in a ranger program then catching a current movie at the outdoor Pinecrest Theater under the stars during the summer!

Tip: On weekends during summer months, plan to arrive early. Parking can become full.

That's not all! Near Pinecrest you can play disc golf or mountain bike at Dodge Ridge Mountain Resort or get in the saddle for a guided trail ride into the wilderness at Aspen Meadow Pack Station.

STANISLAUS NATIONAL FOREST

Pinecrest Lake and most of the land surrounding Highway 108 is part of the sprawling Stanislaus National Forest. Before continuing up the highway, stop by the Summit Ranger Station located right on Highway 108 and Pinecrest Lake Road. Knowledgeable rangers provide useful information and maps to help you get the very most of your time, including up-to-date trail and road information.

Here are just a few ideas for things to do on the Stanislaus National Forest...

- Start with a look into the culture of the original inhabitants of the area, the Me-Wuk. The Shadow of the Mi-Wok Trail is directly across the street from the Summit Ranger Station and offers an easy ¼ mile walk through an outdoor exhibit showing the Me-Wuk Indians' way of life.
- If you're up for an unusual hike, try the Trail of the Gargoyles off Herring Creek Road near Strawberry. The trail winds through some interesting volcanic features that resemble gargoyles. Take in the views and the feeling that you may be on another planet.
- Stop at Donnell Vista to take the short, leisurely walk to a dramatic scenic overlook safely perched high above Donnell Reservoir. Sweeping views of the reservoir below and the peculiar rock formations off in the distance, the Dardanelles, will have you mesmerized.

KENNEDY MEADOWS

Heading toward Sonora Pass, the summit of Highway 108 at 9,623 feet, you'll come to Kennedy Meadows before the final ascent. This is where you'll truly feel like a mountaineer. The remoteness and beauty resonate with adventure seekers, but you don't need to be a hard-core outdoors person to enjoy this area.

The team at Kennedy Meadows Resort and Pack Station will make you feel right at home with extensive amenities and activities. The amenities at the rustic cabin resort include a full-service restaurant, saloon, and general store—all open to the public.

A popular activity at Kennedy Meadows is horseback riding. Join a guided trail ride into the wilderness and see the mountains the way the pioneers did. A trip to Relief Reservoir or beyond into the Emigrant Wilderness is one-of-a-kind.

Fish until your heart's content and your limit is met on the Stanislaus River, which runs through the resort and surrounding forests and meadows. It is excellent for trout fishing. Or, pack a daypack and venture out on your own on a nearby trail.

QUE DE PORKA OVERLOOK

For a short and fun addition to your trip, drive a mile east of the Kennedy Meadows turnoff on Highway 108 and wind through the interesting rock feature, "Que de Porka" which translates to "pig's tail." Just beyond it is an overlook that offers a high vantage point of Kennedy Meadows making for an obvious photo opportunity.

SONORA PASS


One of the most spectacular mountain passes you will ever experience, Sonora Pass offers incredible vistas, late spring waterfalls and brilliant fall color. This pass closes for winter, but spring welcomes the season's first road trippers, many on the Epic High Sierra Loop driving Sonora Pass to Highway 395 to Highway 120, Tioga Pass, back through Yosemite National Park. Put this one on your bucket list!

COME IN THE WINTER FOR "SNOW" MUCH FUN

Not only is the Highway 108 corridor full of fair-weather adventure and fun, but it also provides the closest snow to the San Francisco Bay Area in the winter. Come up and ski or snowboard at Dodge Ridge Mountain Resort, or enjoy safe, family-fun snow tubing at Leland Meadows High Sierra Snowplay and ice skating at The Long Barn Lodge Ice Rink.

Tip: Check the road conditions before you go at roads.dot.ca.gov or call 1-800-427-7623.

*Highway 108/Sonora Pass closes for the winter, generally November through May, beyond Leland Meadows every year. Donnell Vista, Kennedy Meadows, the Que de Porka Overlook and other areas above 6,300 feet elevation are not accessible during that time.

95% of visitors only see 5% of Posemite. Explore the less visited and uncrowded areas outside the Valley Floor – like Hetch Hetchy Reservoir and the Tuolumne Grove of Giant Sequoias.

Visit the park November through March when it is much less crowded, and you'll get the best of fall colors and beautiful winter scenes.

Take alternate transportation

like YARTS (Yosemite Area Regional Transportation System) or tour guide providers, and you will not need a Peak Hour Day-Use reservation!

Plan ahead and reserve area lodging for peak season and weekends early.

Sign up to receive text alerts from the park. Text YNPTraffic to 333111.

While in Yosemite Valley, once parked, travel around by foot, free shuttle, or bike (bike rentals available seasonally).


Dogs are allowed on paved trails,


roads, in campgrounds (except walk-in campgrounds), and in parking lots where indicated. Dogs must be on a leash at all times and picked up after. Do not leave dogs unattended.

Call ahead for current road and weather conditions, especially in winter: 209-372-0200.

GPS is unreliable in and around the park; utilize paper maps to get around.














Yosemite Area Itinerary



Experience Tuolumne County's Yosemite and Beyond

The Highway 120 corridor is the most direct route to iconic Yosemite National Park from the San Francisco Bay Area and Northern California. Not only does it provide convenient passage to the park, it also offers a road trip where there's something for everyone in your party, from the history buff to the outdoor adventurer.

This itinerary begins from the west and heads east along Highway 120. It can certainly be done in reverse from the east, heading west.

LAKE DON PEDRO

Nestled in the Sierra Nevada foothills, Lake Don Pedro offers 160 miles of shoreline and thousands of acres of water surface for a plethora of activities. Fish from the shore or on the water, rent a ski boat, kayak, or paddle board. Rent a houseboat for a relaxing, star-studded overnight stay. Developed trails, day-use areas, and campgrounds provide land-based fun.

Continuing east toward the town of Groveland, make a stop at Around the Horn Brewing Company, a popular destination for visitors and locals. Relax with a glass of one of their continuously changing craft brews (there's even some for non-beer lovers) a tasty meal, and maybe a cornhole game in the shaded beer garden.

GROVELAND AREA

DOWNTOWN GROVELAND

Groveland, a gateway town to Yosemite, played a key role in the California Gold Rush, and in the history of Yosemite and even the city of San Francisco, 145 miles away. Discover the cultural and natural stories of the area at the Groveland Yosemite Gateway Museum, located at Mary Laveroni Park and open year-round.

The town isn't very large, so leave the car parked and wander on foot if you would like. Explore Main Street to find unique shops, including recreation supplies stores, restaurants, coffee shops, nursery (with California native plants), and the longest continuously operating saloon in California, the Iron Door Saloon.

PINE MOUNTAIN LAKE

Visit Pine Mountain Lake on the outskirts of town to play a round at the public, championship Pine Mountain Lake Golf Course that boasts spectacular views of Yosemite's peaks (club and cart rentals are available), and enjoy a meal at the adjacent Grill, also featuring great views. For a mild Wild West adventure, saddle up for a horseback ride at the Pine Mountain Lake Equestrian Center.

STANISLAUS NATIONAL FOREST

Continuing on, Highway 120 passes through the Stanislaus National Forest, which borders Yosemite National Park. The national forest is a haven for adventure seekers with choices of activities like whitewater rafting, biking, fishing, hiking, and camping. Stop by the Groveland Ranger Station, where helpful rangers can answer questions and provide maps and current information about trails and more. Here are a few ideas to make the most of your visit to the national forest:

- Whitewater rafting with up to Class V runs on the Wild and Scenic Tuolumne River is thrilling and creates life-long memories. There are several local outfitters ready to take you on an exciting, world-class rafting adventure, each offering their own specialties.
- The Tuolumne River also has optimal water for fishing. If you've tried fly-fishing or are an avid angler, you know the exhilaration that comes with being stream-side, casting a line. If you haven't tried it or would just like to go out with a local guide, ECHO Adventure Cooperative can take you for a couple hours or a whole day.
- Get your gears moving on two wheels. New, exciting mountain bike trails are being built and expanded on a regular basis by a team of devoted volunteers of Groveland Trail Heads. Within the Ferretti Road Non-Motorized Trail Network, just outside of Groveland, is a 1.3-mile bike-only trail that features long drops, log ride, jumps, berms, and rollers. The features have go-arounds so they can be avoided, making the trail accessible for all skill levels. Don't have bikes with you? Rent some in town.
- Miller's Off-Road Adventures offers
 Jeep tours that will fill your sense of
 adventure as you take off on dirt roads
 and through creeks and streams.

YOSEMITE NATIONAL PARK

Top off your gas tank, or charge up, grab some snacks and water, and head to Yosemite National Park. Famous for its iconic granite monoliths like Half Dome and the gushing waterfalls in Yosemite Valley, the park has a quieter, less crowded side. Over half of the park is in Tuolumne County where there's room to roam in less crowded surroundings at Hetch Hetchy Reservoir, in the Tuolumne Grove of Giant Sequoias, and Tuolumne Meadows.

HETCH HETCHY RESERVOIR

Head east on Highway 120 toward Yosemite, turn left on Evergreen Road and venture to Hetch Hetchy Reservoir. You'll get glimpses of it from the road but once there you will find the expansive deep blue lake, which is the water source for much of San Francisco, surrounded by impressive granite peaks. Cross the O'Shaughnessy Dam, walk through the tunnel, and hike the uncrowded lake-side trail to waterfalls that are comparable in beauty to their more famous rivals in Yosemite Valley. No reservations are required to visit the Hetch Hetchy area.

Tips: Arrive early as parking is limited and the road is open for limited hours (varies seasonally). Bring plenty of water and sturdy shoes.

TUOLUMNE GROVE OF GIANT SEQUOIAS


Head through the Big Oak Flat entrance of the park, take Highway 120 east at Crane Flat, and park at the Tuolumne Grove of Giant Sequoias trailhead (1 mile east of Crane Flat). Enjoy a peaceful hike to and through the grove of massive thousands-of-years old trees. Although it is the smallest of Yosemite's three Sequoia groves, the trees and landscape plus the wildlife you may see are inspiring none-the-less.

TUOLUMNE MEADOWS

If you have time to travel farther, continue east on Highway 120 (Tioga Road) to Tuolumne Meadows, you won't be disappointed with the drive and the views. This historic road winds through the higher elevations of Yosemite offering unbelievable views of Half Dome and Tenaya Lake along the way. Suddenly the forest and surrounding granite cliffs open up and the expanse of spectacular Tuolumne Meadows is in front of you. Beautiful trails around the meadow and along the crystal-clear Tuolumne River await hikers of all skill levels.

Note: Tioga Road is closed during winter.

Recreational opportunities in this region such as mountain biking and rafting on one of the most sought out whitewater rivers, the Tuolumne, have been established by those who are passionate about providing adventure for all, while carefully pioneering responsible ways to play on the land and water and protect this beautiful and environmentally important area.

DWIGHT FOLLIEN, FOUNDING MEMBER

VTC: How long have you been mountain biking in Tuolumne County?

GTH: I've been riding in Tuolumne County since I moved back to Groveland in the summer of 2011.

VTC: Why did you choose this region to start Groveland Trail Heads?



GTH: This region chose me. Groveland, with the Stanislaus National Forest in our "backyard" has some amazing terrain for mountain bike trails. Currently there are only two single-track trail systems that allow mountain bikes here. Groveland is an ideal place for mountain bike trails due to the elevation, year-round riding, proximity (one to four hours away from major metropolitan locations). There are also many, many, many people driving through Groveland on their way to Yosemite who stop to ride the mountain bike trails at Ferretti Trails then get some food and visit shops in town before heading to the park. There are also miles and miles of National Forest Service dirt and gravel roads for epic long-distance rides and bike packing, and the views of the Tuolumne River Canyon and Yosemite's backcountry are just amazing.

VTC: What is your favorite part about mountain biking?

GTH: The freedom and exhilaration I feel, and how riding a bike is so good for my mind and body. It's therapy for my mind and fitness for my body. I'm always happy when I'm riding. The connection I feel to the forest while riding the trails puts a smile on my face.

VTC: How long does it take to construct a trail?

GTH: The time it takes to complete a trail (planning, design, and construction) varies depending on a lot of factors such as funding, weather, location, trail plan, distance of the trail, width of the trail, design of the trail, which trail user groups will be using the trail, the amount of vegetation and brush that needs to be removed to create the trail's corridor, the number of people involved... will the trail be built by hand, mechanized equipment or a combination of both? For just an estimate I'd say any time from six months to two years to complete one to six miles of trail depending on the factors.

VTC: What is one thing that you would want everyone to know about Groveland Trail Heads?

GTH: Our mountain bike-specific trail system will benefit local businesses by drawing riders from near and far while providing residents with an exhilarating outdoor activity close to home and providing education for youth on forest stewardship while highlighting the cultural and historic significance of the land... this is our solution to the challenges rural communities face.



VTC: How long have you been rafting in Tuolumne County?

SM: I started guiding whitewater rafting tours on the Stanislaus River in 1965 and the Tuolumne River in 1969. I raised my family here in Sonora. My son, Tom, grew up in the industry and is now starting his family in Groveland overlooking the Tuolumne River watershed and managing our operations.

VTC: Why did you choose this region to start Sierra Mac?

SM: In the 1970's my rafting company ran many river rafting tours all over Northern California. When I started raising my family, I decided to focus on one river and chose the Tuolumne River as it is a clear standout for the best whitewater rapid course in North America. The Tuolumne River not only has outstanding scenery, but its rapids are high end notorious world class. The Cherry Creek/Upper Tuolumne section is renown as the "Gold Standard" for class V rapids (highest navigable rating)

SM: The thrill of being successful navigating a raft down a steep course defined by rocks and liquid gravity. Sharing this experience with our guests is awesome and very special!

VTC: How long does it take to complete a river trip?

SM: Our river raft trips last from a one-day tour to as long as three days with wilderness camping along the shores of the river, swimming, and exploring the side stream canyons.

VTC: What is one thing that you would want everyone to know about Sierra Mac River Trips?

SM: Putting yourself into a raft going down rapids and splashing through its waves is some of the best fun you'll ever have! An experience you will always remember! We love our work and are happy to be guides!



Spring: Colorful wildflowers fill the foothills of the Sierra and Gold Country every spring. Take a hike to see them up close.

Summer: Summers in Tuolumne County should be spent near the water. Go boating, fishing, or swimming in one of the many lakes and rivers.

Fall: Fall is most locals' favorite season in Tuolumne County. From yearly festivals to changing leaves, it is the perfect time of year to explore.

Winter: Watch as Tuolumne County turns into a winter wonderland. Snowboard, ski, tube, ice skate, or make a snowman. The choice is yours. Be sure to park and play in designated areas only.

WINTER DRIVING: Highway 120 is open year-round to Yosemite National Park and into Yosemite Valley. Tioga Pass over the Sierra is closed for the winter and opens around the first of June. Highway 108's Sonora Pass is closed over the Sierra after the first major snowfall but is kept plowed to Leland Meadows and Dodge Ridge. Sonora Pass usually reopens in mid-May. It is always advisable to carry chains in the mountains during the winter. Snow rarely falls as low as downtown Sonora.

- Always check the weather before you head out. High Country weather can and does change quickly.
- Be prepared! Carry extra water, food and appropriate survival supplies.
- Dress for all kinds of weather-bring layers.

Be a Good Steward

 Tuolumne County is Too Cool to Trash! Always leave a place better than when you arrived, pack out your litter and recycle and dispose of it properly.

• Respect wildlife.

°Use bear-proof lockers where they're available or bear-proof canisters when backpacking

- Stick to marked trails to avoid harming plants, and consider taking a bag to pick up trash along your hike.
- Dogs should be on a leash while on trails and streets and picked up after.
- Please don't disturb cultural artifacts.

Using GPS

We do not recommend using GPS to get around Tuolumne County, especially in the mountains.

Use maps or stop by a Visitors Center or Ranger Station for directions. Using a GPS in a rural area can send you on the wrong roads or roads not suitable for regular vehicles.

Caring for Tuolumne County can only be done together. It's the only sure way to preserve this beautiful area and prevent the very real devastation that comes from wildfires. For the safety of all, please keep these fire safety tips in mind when visiting the area.

Fire Safety Tips:

Please use extreme caution during dry conditions and follow all laws regarding open fires, as well as have an emergency plan and follow any evacuation orders.

When Having a BBQ or Using a Fireplace:

- Ensure there is 10 feet of clearance around your BBQ.
- Dispose of ash in a metal container with a lid away from any flammable materials.
- Ashes may take several days to cool completely in the can. Do not discard them until they are cool enough to touch.

When Using Equipment:

- Ensure your equipment is in good working order and that you are using it correctly. Mow before 10 am, and never on windy days.
- All gas-powered equipment (ATV's, generators, motocross bikes, weedeaters, lawn mowers, etc.) require a spark arrestor. Check your equipment prior to use to ensure your spark arrestor is installed and is clean and serviceable.

When Target Shooting:

- Shoot in areas free of vegetation.
- Use safe targets, such as paper or clay pigeons, as steel targets or rocks may throw sparks into nearby vegetation.
- Have a shovel and fire extinguisher on hand in case a fire does spark.

Things to Do



Outdoor Adventure

Mother Nature shows off her best in Tuolumne County and Yosemite. Outdoor enthusiasts of all types are drawn here year-round to sight-see and recreate on extensive public lands featuring hundreds of miles of hiking, biking, and horseback riding trails, crystal clear lakes, rivers and streams for boating, fishing and swimming, campgrounds for RVs or roughing it in a tent. Winter brings bright brilliant white snow, perfect for skiing, snowboarding, tubing, and cross-country skiing.

Biking

Tuolumne County offers up some of the most fun on two wheels around. Mountain biking is evolving fast here, with new trails being built and existing ones being expanded continuously. Whether you're just starting out or are a seasoned veteran, there's a trail with your name on it, including those perfect the whole family. From meandering railroad grades to challenging single track trails, find your favorite in Tuolumne County. A couple of options are Dodge Ridge Mountain Resort off of Highway 108 and Ferretti Trail Network in Groveland.

Disc Golf

Disc golf is quickly growing in popularity, and Tuolumne County has no shortage of courses with the most per capita of any county in California. Bring a disc and your a-game and try one or more of the courses ranging in locale from the Gold Country foothills to the mountains: Three Links Camp, Indigeny Reserve, Dodge Ridge Mountain Resort, Pioneer Park near Columbia,

Columbia Airport, Twain Harte Golf Course, Cougar Point near New Melones Reservoir, and Sierra Bible Church.

Fishing

The waters of Tuolumne County are full of all types of fish for year-round casting. From vast low elevation reservoirs to secluded lakes and rivers in the mountains, there's a spot to suit any angler. Need some lessons and tips? Let one of our local fishing guides like Echo Adventure Cooperative take you on a half-day or full-day trip to a spectacular spot.

Gold Panning

It's exciting to get your hands dirty and get a little wet as you discover your inner miner and search for GOLD. There's still a lot of California's most precious metal left in these hills, and there are gold panning adventure companies, like California Gold Panning that teach prospecting for determined miners who seek a true Gold Country experience in the stream. Matelot Gulch Mining Co. and Hidden Treasure Gold Mine in Columbia State Historic Park offers sluice box panning.

Golfing

The rolling hills of the Mother Lode are as picturesque as the fairways and greens are challenging. Two 18-hole championship courses, Pine Mountain Lake Golf Course and Teleli Golf Course, and one 9-hole course in Twain Harte give golfers options for a delightful day on a scenic course in the rolling foothills or in the pines. Twain Harte Miniature Golf is fun for the whole family to putt a round.

Hiking

Hiking is the number one outdoor activity in Tuolumne County! Hundreds of miles of trails lead to spectacular vistas and unique geologic formations like Highway 108's Columns of the Giants or Yosemite's Hetch Hetchy Reservoir. Sonora's urban escape trail, Dragoon Gulch, is expanded regularly and provides a bird's eye view of historic downtown. Looking for a guided adventure? Local outfitters are standing by to take you on an epic hike, a multiday backpacking trip and everything in between!

Horseback Riding

Experience the High Sierra the way the pioneers first saw it--on horseback with either Aspen Meadow Pack Station or Kennedy Meadows Pack Station. From a leisurely half-hour ride to an adventuresome week-long pack trip into the Emigrant Wilderness, you'll see the best of the Sierra from the best seat in the house—your saddle. For a milder Old West adventure, rides at the Pine Mountain Lake Equestrian Center trot through gorgeous oak woodlands.

Hundreds of miles of scenic riding trails are available for horseback riders and their horses to explore.

Off Roading

Get off the pavement and hit the rugged dirt roads of the Stanislaus National Forest near Groveland with a guided off-road Jeep tour with Miller's Off-Road Adventures. Take the wheel yourself or let the guide drive, regardless, you're in for a fun and exciting experience.

and the surrounding mountains from a different perspective—from the air. Soar above Hetch Hetchy Reservoir and Tuolumne Meadows and icons like Half Dome and El Capitan with Yosemite Flights.

Winter Fun

Experience winter in Tuolumne County's High Country where you have easy access to classic winter fun and a host of new adventures waiting for you! From skiing to snow tubing, there's something for everyone's favorite snow day adventure.

Shopping

You never know what treasures you'll find in the shops, galleries, and boutiques of Tuolumne County. Charming smalltown main streets are lined with eclectic stores offering everything from the latest clothing trends and outdoor gear to antiques, and local goods and handmade crafts.

Film Commission





The Yosemite Area is Paw-Some

Hiking on one or more of the numerous trails or picnicking alongside the Tuolumne River near Yosemite is a wonderful way to spend the day. The Middle Fork Day Use Area off Evergreen Road on the Stanislaus National Forest is a peaceful spot and easy to get to.

Groveland, the gateway town into Yosemite, is fun to explore. Settle in for a peaceful lunch at Mountain Sage Coffee and Nursery or enjoy craft-beer and light faire in the beer garden at Around the Horn Brewing Company.

Planning an outing with your dog in Yosemite National Park? There are some things to know before you go. Dogs are welcome on the Valley Floor of Yosemite Valley as long as you remain on paved roads and paths and in developed campgrounds (unless otherwise posted). In Tuolumne Meadows, you can bring your leashed dog on roads that are open to vehicles. Some of the places where dogs cannot go in Yosemite are O'Shaughnessy Dam at Hetch Hetchy Reservoir, on shuttle buses, on unpaved trails, and near lodging areas. Have a Howlin' Good Time in Gold Country

JAMESTOWN:

Leashed dogs are welcome to visit Railtown 1897 State Historic Park. If they are well behaved, they can even ride the excursion trains!

Outside of Jamestown, near the town of Chinese Camp, the Red Hills Recreation Management Area offers hiking trails in a landscape noticeably different from the surrounding countryside. The serpentine-based soils in the area support a unique assemblage of plant species to enjoy.

The Vista Trail, a new dog-friendly hiking trail at Lake Don Pedro offers rewarding views of the lake and a great workout for you and your pup.

Things to Know About Bringing Your Dog to Tuolumne County

So many people love to travel with their dogs. To keep it fun for everyone, please be respectful by following these simple guidelines:

- •In Tuolumne County, dogs must be on leash while in public areas and on trails and streets, including on federal and state public lands.
- •Never leave your dog unattended and especially do not leave your dog in a hot car.
- •Please bag your dog's waste and dispose of it properly.
- Stay on designated trails.
- Respect wildlife.
- •Bring plenty of water.

COLUMBIA:

Columbia State Historic Park is full of history and pup-lovin' adventures. Dogs can walk with their owners through the 1850s Gold Rush town and even ride the stagecoach. They might even be able to help ward off gold robbing outlaws!

Grab a delicious lunch from Columbia Kate's Teahouse or ice cream from the Fallon House Ice Cream Parlor to enjoy in one of the pristine picnic areas in the park.

SONORA:

Historic Downtown Sonora is especially dog-friendly, with plenty of shops, restaurants, and lodging that welcomes pets. Dog-friendly outdoor dining options include the Sonora Brewing Company and Diamondback Grill. Stop by Local Collective to shop for unique, locally made merchandise and coffee while your pooch enjoys a "pup cup."

Stretch your legs and those of your fourlegged friend on the Dragoon Gulch Trail. Located on the outskirts of the city center, this system of trails leads up the rolling hillside with stunning views of the city. Visit Indigeny Reserve, a 160-acre apple orchard and distillery that creates local organic hard ciders. Although the hard cider might not be pet-friendly the beautiful, shaded hiking trails and picnic area are.

Scamper Around the High Sierra

The Stanislaus National Forest is full of pup-friendly trails to hike. A local favorite is the Sugar Pine Railway Trail, an easy, level 6-mile round trip trail that runs along the South Fork of the Stanislaus River. Another choice is the Trail of the Gargoyles featuring unusual volcanic rock formations and spectacular Sierra views.

Take the dog on a fun ride when you rent a kayak or boat at the Pinecrest Lake Marina. Or pack a picnic lunch to enjoy on a lakeside break as you hike the scenic 4-mile Pinecrest Trail. Please keep your pets leashed and stay in areas designated for dogs.

Outdoor dog-friendly dining is available at The Sugar Shack in Sugar Pine.












Shopping



Culture & Heritage



Chicken Ranch Rancheria Me-Wuk Indians

Nestled in the foothills of California's Sierra Nevada Mountains in Tuolumne County, Chicken Ranch Rancheria of Me-Wuk Indians is a federally recognized tribe with a rich history marked by triumph over adversity.

Centuries ago, the Me-Wuk natives thrived in this picturesque region, with their ancestral territories extending from Table Mountain (Yawali Sleeping Giant) to the rolling hills of the lower Red Hills area. Vibrant villages like Suchumumu (Chicken Ranch) and Chuckachino (Jamestown) were at the heart of their culture. Their legacy also touches Woods Creek Rotary Park and the Mother Lode Fair Grounds in Sonora, California.

The Gold Rush era brought immense change, forcing Me-Wuk people

from their ancestral lands into more remote areas.

In 1958, the California Rancheria Act terminated the recognition of 41 rancherias, including Chicken Ranch Rancheria. Its goal was assimilation into the broader community. By 1961, tribal status was revoked, and the trust status of rancheria lands was terminated, leading to their distribution among adult residents.

Before this, tribal members lived in substandard conditions with minimal infrastructure. The promises of the Rancheria Act remained unfulfilled, and county regulations took precedence, leading to the forced sale of many properties.

In 1979, 17 rancherias, including Chicken Ranch Rancheria, united to file a class-


action suit to regain their reservation status. In 1983, they succeeded, marking the revival of 17 rancherias representing a diverse array of tribes.

In 1985, Chicken Ranch Rancheria formally regained federal recognition. Unfortunately, only one tribal member, Inez Mathiesen, retained a 3-acre parcel, a mere 7% of the original reservation.

Chicken Ranch Rancheria remains committed to preserving its cultural heritage. The cultural department diligently works to rebuild and nurture traditional knowledge, stories, language, and songs. Their spirit and dedication to preserving their legacy embody the tribe's remarkable resilience.

For tens of thousands of years, the Me-Wuk people have lived in central California. Spanning as far west as the central coast and as far as the Sierra Nevada mountains to the east. The first recorded contact between the Central Sierra Me-Wuk and non-native explorers was by the Gabriel Moraga Expedition of 1806. A few decades later in 1848, the Central Sierra Me-Wuk, as well as all Native Americans across the state of California, would be greatly affected by the California gold rush.

After years of gold miners and other settlers forcing the Me-Wuk people from their homelands, the Bureau of Indian Affairs purchased 289 acres from J.H. and Carolyn Smith in August of 1910. This land would become the Rancheria of

The Tuolumne Band of Me-Wuk Indians. On October 25, 1910, the Tribe would gain federal recognition from Congress. In 1935 many of the Tribe's governing documents were created, including the Tribe's constitution and by-laws. All current members of the Tribe are descended from the Tribe's 1935 census roll. The Tribe consists of 498 members and the governing body is comprised of 141 council members including four elected Tribal Officers.

Like many other tribes in the United States, the Tuolumne Band of Me-Wuk Indians dealt with many economic hardships throughout the 1900's. In 1988, Congress passed The Indian Gaming Regulatory Act, which allowed federally recognized tribes to operate gaming businesses on their lands. On May 15, 2001 the Tribe opened Black Oak Casino Resort to help provide economic

assistance and establish many programs for its members.

The Tribe is now one of the largest employers in Tuolumne County and provides several services to the Tribe's community and the city of Tuolumne such as a fire department, Tribal Security, a medical clinic, a pharmacy, and a dental clinic. Along with providing for the members within the Tribe, the Tuolumne Band of Me-Wuk Indians have donated millions of dollars throughout Tuolumne County and its surrounding counties.

The Latin/Hispanic American Presence in **Tuolumne County**

Tuolumne County has a rich and complex history, from the first inhabitants of this land, the Me-Wuk people, to the arrival of colonizers and gold seekers that brought drastic changes and devastation to the native culture and environment. to modern days of contradictory perspectives and unarquable beautiful forests, rivers, and lakes.

The county also was at some point in time, one of the most culturally and linguistically diverse areas, including the Latin/Hispanic community, which has been present in the region for generations. Their influence and contributions can be seen in many aspects of the county's culture, such as the language, cuisine, music, rodeos, and even the name of the county seat originally named "El Campo de Los Sonorenses," now Sonora, which pays tribute to the founders who came from Sonora, Mexico.

However, history tells us also of the difficult transitions the Latin/Hispanic community has experienced from being under Spanish and Mexican flags to becoming part of the USA. While Mexico had abolished slavery and granted

women rights to own property in the 1820s, they found themselves later fighting in the California's Congress to preserve those rights.

Latin/women's rights had an impact in California. A fair number of real estate deeds show that Latin/Hispanic women owned property and businesses in Sonora, Jamestown, and Columbia. These women were smart entrepreneurs, raised families and participated actively in community affairs. Like Dona Elisa Martinez business "El Campo de Martinez" that provided jobs to over one thousand workers. Another businessperson, Dona Ygnacia Ramirez, owned multiple parcels of land in Jamestown and Sonora, including one that contained a dancing hall and a bowling alley, which she deeded to her son R.A. Preston.

Currently two streets in Sonora are named after Latin/Hispanics Jacinto Barreto, and the brothers Simon and Jose Maria Cabezut, merchants and ranch owners in the 1860s.

Although the Latino/Hispanic community were busy building business and providing for their families they also knew how to have fun! When the community learned of the victory of the battle of Puebla, Mexico on May 5th,

1862, thousands of miles away, here in Tuolumne County they found a way to celebrate. Their characteristic spirit of joy, independence and camaraderie erupted in parades and music and dances!

The first spontaneous celebration of Cinco de Mayo leads the way for it to be an American tradition that quickly spread throughout California, Nevada, and Oregon. It traveled by way of the civic organizations called 'Juntas Patrióticas,' made up of prominent community minded men and women of Latin/ Hispanic heritage.

Today, we celebrate the presence and contributions of people of Latin/Hispanic American heritage in Tuolumne County, and invite you to discover the many stories, and the places that shelter the vestiges of that era.

Visit Columbia State Historic Park on May 4th & 5th, 2024 to rejoice in the annual Festival of "Cinco de Mayo" to experience history, cultural traditions, and arts that tell the stories of the Latin-American community in Tuolumne County!






